A Statistical Overview of Sendable Stamps

Based on A.I. Diagiamini's Personal Database



Why a Database?

Because wasting a letter is a terrible thing.

- As someone who collects stamps regularly and has a large collection —
 over 1,100 and counting I created a spreadsheet with my sendable seals
 and the penpals I correspond with to avoid attaching duplicates when
 writing replies.
- Sending someone something they already have is a blatant lack of SLOWLY etiquette (patent pending).
- Stamps can be categorized in areas such as "Achievements & Commemorations," "Sets," "Singles," and "Countries." For this non-scientific study, we'll focus on the latter.
- Country stamps represent 51 percent of attachables I can send to other users (528 of 1,035).

Key Points to Consider

528 stamps, 169 countries, lots of interesting data to chew on.

- Database considers stamps available by default means, i.e., acquiring them when accessing the app overseas, or buying them through the Time Machine and World Explorer.
- Since traveling abroad from Chile is expensive as hell, I'm not counting country-exclusive seals nor stamps gifted to yours truly. Seals available only on certain locations/dates, e.g. flag stamps, are also excluded from the database I won't resort to cheating to get them like most losers do.
- 44 countries have 4+ sendable stamps; 53 can send 2 or 3; and a whopping 72 only have 1 stamp.
- The big question: Are the SLOWLY Overlords (TM) showing a blatant continental bias when designing and adding stamps?



Despite being the 2nd-most populous continent at 17.6 percent of Earth's population, Africa has the 2nd-lowest amount of sendable seals.

Its proportion of 1-stamp countries is also the highest of all continents.

The Americas amount for 13 percent of Earth's population, but only have 18.75 percent of total sendables.

Also have the 2nd-highest proportion of 1-stamp countries.

Asia has 32.95 percent of total sendables, with an evident Overlord preference for India and the Far East. The rest of the continent might as well be an afterthought.

3rd-highest concentration of 1-stamp countries.

Europe has some of the most prolific sendables. The UK alone has as many as US and MX combined, while its top 3 are 5 seals short of South America's 12 countries as a unit!

Even with nearly 1/4 of the continent at 1-stamp level, it still has the least neglect.

Though 1-stamp countries account for half of the total, the sample is too small to be ranked.

Are the Slowly Overlords (TM) showing a blatant continental bias when designing and adding stamps?









Asia and Europe have 2/3 of top senders worldwide.


Asia, on its own, outnumbers the other three continents combined.



Non-Scientific Conclusions



- The Overlords **aren't even trying to hide their Eurasian favoritism,** with about 70 percent of sendables focused on those two continents. Their combined population is about 5.44 billion. Still, Africa has more people than every continent except Asia, and the Americas handily beat Europe by some 535 million.
- Still, Europe and Asia receive new stamp sets and singles more often and way faster than everyone else, e.g. typical food/culture sets or the "Castles" series, which helps explain the disparity to some extent. Another possible factor limiting third-world and southern hemisphere use of Slowly could be the quality of Internet access, albeit rural Europe and Asia aren't immune to said problem.



- Despite publicly available data, the Overlords stubbornly insist on ignoring their own feedback site, where numerous stamp requests from non-Eurasian nations pile up gathering dust despite having more upvotes than many completed ones.
- If the devs insist on stuffing the bellies of the same countries over and over, **they'll never grow a fanbase elsewhere** Slowly will become a meaningless anecdote or remain in the shadows for 2.47 billion of current/potential members. **Either Kevin Wong et al. have zero business sense, or are way too lazy to look beyond their immediate horizon.**
- And no, the lack of available personnel isn't a valid excuse. You
 can still outsource design work, which is key for stamps, at affordable
 rates when you have an app boasting 8+ million installs.



Will the situation remain unchanged a year from now? That's a story I'll tell in due time.
